SUPPORT ATZ FARMHOUSE CHAPTER SCHOLARSHIPS

The Ohio State Foundation Council of FarmHouse Fraternity has the wonderful opportunity to facilitate a number of donor-sponsored scholarships to outstanding members each year. With the increased costs of tuition, housing and books, an increase in the amount or number of scholarships would certainly help our fraternity members.

Two different and easy methods can be utilized to provide a scholarship:

"A Pass-Through Scholarship" This is a scholarship that is provided by annual gifts of any amount by the donor in support of their scholarship. These scholarships are not endowed and are dependent on the annual gift by the donor and is awarded only as long as the funds are provided. This type of scholarship is illustrated by the John Leonard

Memorial Scholarships provided by Jim Leonard in honor of his Father. We are so grateful for the \$80,000 in scholarships, Jim provided over the years. However, with Jim's passing, this will be the final year the John Leonard Memorial Scholarships will be presented.

In contrast, "An Endowed Scholarship" endures forever as only a portion of the growth of the fund is used to provide the scholarship. The endowed scholarships are administered by the National FarmHouse Foundation and require a minimum cumulative contribution of \$10,000 for the scholarship to start to be awarded.
